According to our source:

"Four 'big round objects' seen in the sky east of his home are still puzzling Raymond Martin, 32, of Covington, Route 3.

"He and his wife, who also witnessed the strange sight, are not sure just what they saw. But they do know it was something unusual.

"Martin said he was getting ready to go to work at the General Motors Central Foundry plant in Danville when he noticed the objects in the east. It was about 5 a. m. and the lights were noticeable in the darkness.

"They seemed to be 'two or three miles away,' Martin said, when they were first detected. He estimated they were a half-mile apart and moving in a straight line.

"As they came closer, both Mr. and Mrs. Martin saw what seemed to be blinking lights on the two objects at either end. 'It might have been they were turning around so that the lights only seemed to blink,' Martin added.

"The unidentified objects soon disappeared, continuing to keep in formation as they 'whizzed out of sight.'

"Thinking over the incident, Martin said: 'I have no idea as to what they might have been. It's certainly hard to explain.'" (xx.)

A READER wants someone to verify what he saw on Tybee Road the other morning.

"I wonder if someone else could have seen this. Someone must have!" he writes.

It was about 4:30 a. m. "I was on my way home when I saw the object about two miles beyond the Bull River bridge. The object was standing completely still and was about 30 to 40 feet above the marsh.

A strange color of light, the like of which I have never seen before, was shining inside the object, and it was very dim. I was about 350 feet away. I estimate the object was about 40 to 65 feet in length and 15 to 20 feet high and was disc shaped. When I first saw the object I was driving at a high rate of speed, and at first thought it was some kind of Christmas lights, but then I realized that no one lived near there. I slowed down and stopped. . . . For some strange reason I reached under my car seat and got my .22 caliber pistol.

"Then I heard a strange hum. This sound felt like it was going through me, and I was beginning to feel numb. I pointed my pistol at it and fired nine shots. I don't know if I hit anything because I was gone from the place where I was standing in about two seconds. When I got home, I told no one about it, and I lay awake trying to figure out what it was. I thought that somebody could have tried to play or pull a hoax. If it was, it must have cost them about 10 to 15 thousand dollars. I was not drinking."

Hovered seven hours?

A news dispatch states:

“Near Campo de Quiroga at 31 miles from Salta, several persons saw a UFO that stayed for seven hours above the town. According to the witnesses, the UFO had an oval form, and reflected the sunbeams off its metallic and polished surface. It got down slowly over a hill of the Monte Negro (Black Mountain), and there it stopped for seven hours. Afterwards, the UFO was out of sight between the clouds.” (xx.)

In a letter to Donald Keyhoe from the APRO director, Coral Lorenzen passed along what she had learned from a phone call to the famous astronomer:

“You’ve probably heard of Tombaugh’s statement regarding UAO [UFO] to AP by now [See the monograph: *UFOs: A History 1957 January-March 22nd*, page 16]. I called him Sunday and talked to him about 35 minutes via long distance. Tombaugh is no dumbbell, and confided that he hasn’t joined any group for fear of becoming entangled in something he couldn’t follow through. He’s the kind who likes to do a perfect job or none at all, and has no time for participation in the work. He mentioned CRIFO [Stringfield’s organization] and what he considers their uniformed and haphazard evaluation of sightings. He was thinking of one particular sighting last summer which any amateur would recognize as Venus, and about which many of our amateur astronomers commented very deprecatingly. Stringfield has been forwarding the *Orbit* to Tombaugh for some time...” (xx.)

'Toots' Maloney Sees Flying Sauce

BRADENTON BEACH: — "Toots" Maloney, who lives at 1st Street North, Bradenton Beach, said in an interview today that he was willing to swear an affidavit to the effect that he saw a flying saucer Sunday night as he was returning home.

"It was about 2 a.m.," said Toots. "I couldn't sleep, so I got up and started walking toward the Cove. Right across from Jack Marshall's facing the Gulf, I saw a light in the sky. At first I thought it was a shooting star because it was too big for a passenger plane and besides the tail and wing-tip lights weren't blinking on and off.

"Well sir, the next thing I know this thing is dropping like an elevator with a broken cable. Like swoosh!" and Toots flung his arm out in a gesture of speed.

"I darn near swallowed my uppers. It kind of settled down about 50 feet off the water and just hung there with a kind of bluish light around the bottom."

Asked about the size and shape of the object, Toots replied. "It looked like a cup without a handle set upside down on a saucer."

"Did you see anyone piloting the saucer?" Toots was asked. "No, there was some yellow light coming from the middle of it but I couldn't see nothing. I had a feeling though that they could see me."

"How long did the object remain?"

"I don't know. It might have been just a few minutes or as long as five or ten. I'd a-given my right arm if Snook Adams had come by in his patrol car but no one was out."

Toots let out a sigh. "Pretty soon the thing started to rise and zingo! it took off. I high-tailed it home and woke up Martha. She asked to smell my breath and then told me that I probably had a nightmare and to go to bed.

"Nobody believes me. People look at you like you got a few marbles missing when you talk about flying saucers. I hope to goodness one of them lands smack dab on the new bridge right in the middle of the celebration. Then maybe folks will wake up a bit."

In order to determine what other Islanders thought of flying saucers several were asked this two-part question: "Do you believe in the existence of flying saucers and have you ever seen one?"

Eld Howard, Holmes Beach. "I don't believe or disbelieve in them. The government has been investigating unidentified flying objects for the past five years. Most of the objects seen by reputable flyers and people can be checked off as natural phenomena but 16 per cent can't. As to the second part of your question, no, I have never seen a flying saucer. But I'll tell you this, I hope with Toots that one shows up for the Bridge Celebration, March 3rd. It would be the greatest publicity the Island ever got."

Sky Saucers Observed by Hebron Pair

Hebron, Feb. 8 (Special) — Are flying saucers coming down to earth?

Maybe not, but two Hebron residents say they got a close enough look at a couple of mysterious objects in the sky Wednesday to offer descriptions of their mechanism.

The Buck Rogers-like tale unfolded last night when the residents, who live on opposite sides of town, met at a social gathering and began comparing notes on the incident.

Hang Motionless in Sky

Mrs. John Bell, Rt. 6A, described two umbrella-shaped milky-white objects hanging motionless in the sky, lower than the usual altitude of commercial airliners.

She said she and her children were in the house when they were startled by a deafening roar which "didn't sound like a jet or anything we had ever heard."

Three or four seconds later, she said, they heard the noise again. This time, she rushed out onto the back porch and saw the objects in the sky.

A Burnt Hill Rd. resident, who prefers to remain unidentified, also reported hearing and seeing similar objects at about the same time.

This resident described the objects as resembling two jellyfish. They seemed to move in perfect unison. "At the time of the first roar, a tentacle-like section lowered from the main body of each object and appeared to propel the missiles forward," the observer said. Streams of vapor were seen issuing from the rear of the objects. With the second roar, the objects disappeared into the sky, the resident said.

Truck Driver Watches Objects In Sky

"I SAW THREE of them. They were orange-red in color and they were moving much too fast for an airplane. They stayed on no definite course. But I observed them, altogether about two hours in the sky."

The words are those of a Stroudsburg truck driver who observed "unidentified flying objects" in the air Tuesday morning.

That was the same morning a Stroudsburg woman watched a strange object zoom across the sky at about 5:15 a.m. The woman had never believed in "flying saucer" stories before. Neither had the truck driver.

The driver makes a regular run with a loaded truck, between Binghamton and Allentown. He was on his way back to Snyder'sville from Allentown Tuesday morning when this happened.

He said he glanced at the sky and saw three lighted objects. They seemed to be hovering, stationary.

Observance

Then the largest of the three seemed to turn the other two loose in the sky and they began to move around real fast. After observing this activity intermittently for some minutes, the truck driver stopped his truck in Moorestown. He watched the objects for about 20 minutes there.

It was at Moorestown that the driver attempted to determine that the largest of the three objects was staying absolutely still. To test this he stationed his arm steadily so that the object was between two fingers slightly spread apart. It did not waver beyond the space, he said.

The other two objects, however, maneuvered through the sky with astonishing speed. One of them, he said, "made it across the span of the sky in 11 seconds . . . and then came back again, then moved off in a different direction."

Tuesday morning was bright and clear, starry and cloudless. There was no fog or mist. There were no lights in the sky.

The large object moved off "toward Stroudsburg" before it stopped and stood still, the driver said. It was still in the sky when he stopped at Wind Gap and showed the objects to several people there. "They all agreed they'd never seen anything like it before," he said.

The truck driver first sighted the objects at about 2:30 a.m. The largest of the three was still in the sky, motionless, when he went to bed at about 4:45.

It was at 5:15 a.m. that the red-colored object was seen moving toward the north by a Stroudsburg housewife who had awakened to change her baby's diaper. She saw the object from the window in her bedroom; observed it as it moved north, then abruptly changed its course—at a right angle—and moved off toward the east.

It's Saucer Season

Police Comb Rooftops in Vain

Police Sgt. Virgil Mayne spent the pre-dawn hours this morning climbing over the roof of the city hall and scaling the fire escapes of the Methodist Hospital in search of flying saucers.

He didn't find any.

He did locate numerous drain holes, vents, roof hatches and evidence of pigeon habitation.

Virgil even scanned the roof of the National Guard Armory, which he could view from one of the hospital's fire escapes.

The agile officer was dutifully following up a report logged at 3:14 a.m.

An inquiry came which said several persons had seen an unidentified flying object on the city hall roof.

Although the Arcadia search failed to turn up any trace of a saucer, residents of Burbank flooded police with reports of persons who said they saw two unidentified flying objects over the city.

Burbank officer Robert Wells, who went outside to investigate, confirmed the presence of the mysterious discs. He said they first appeared last night at about 60,000 feet and traveled at twice the speed of the average jet aircraft.

The officer said the objects would dart across the sky for a time, stand still briefly, then whiz off again.

Mrs. Marjorie Stockton said the object was oval shaped and had "beams of light shoot out from it as if it were searching for something."

She said it finally changed shape, as if it were moving in a new direction. "Then it went straight up and disappeared," she said.

Valley Abuzz

Several persons reported seeing unidentified flying objects in the skies above the San Fernando Valley last night and early today.

Eugene W. Haskins, 23, of 2322 N. Fairview Ave., Burbank, spotted "flying saucers" last night.

He telephoned the Burbank police station and officer Robert Wells went to investigate. Wells said he saw what at first looked like three stars.

"Then one of them began traveling, making at least 1500 miles an hour. It changed color, from white to red to green," he said.

"Presently a similar object appeared high above the first one and gradually dropped to the same level. Then both flew off out of sight."

The officer reported the sighting to the Air Force.

Then at 4:10 a.m. today, an unidentified citizen telephoned the Van Nuys police station and said he sighted a "bluish-like" object winging through the skies as he looked east from Van Nuys Blvd. and Sherman Way.

Police recalled that a rash of unidentified flying objects sighted several months ago turned out to be weather balloons released by Lockheed Aircraft Co. at Burbank.

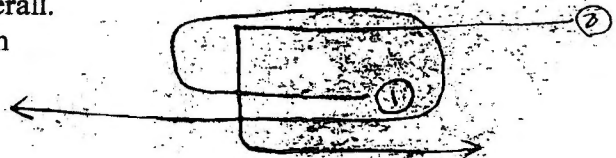
not afraid to discuss what he saw.

"This is what he related to me what he saw; reconstructing it from...[memory? Not clear]. About 6:45 p.m. Sun down. No moon. Clear night. Wind speed 50 knots at 50,000 feet; 60 at 80,000 feet (The...[Not clear] locate clipping. Would you let me know date sometime) He was told to look [at] certain place in sky. [He] saw white light like star. Near Mars. As he watched star [it] moved slightly. Kept watching...[Not clear] seconds later, [it] started moving at high rate of speed. No pickup. Instantly moving at stabilized rate of speed [Abruptly slowed to a steady velocity?]. Estimated altitude 30,000-60,000 feet.

"First object moving left to right (See diagram). Changed direction. Made a sweep back in direction from which it started. As it was making its turn, a second object in the form of a larger, white light appeared. They appeared to be on a collision course. No.2 made a sharp, right angle turn. Then both turned so they were heading away from each other. While moving, No.1 appeared at first as a blinking white light. Off and on. Then showed as a red and green light. Coloured lights seemingly superimposed on white light. Would be white, then red, then back to white (I didn't get the order involved, if any). No.2 did the same.

"They got so far apart, Officer Wells could only watch one at a time. Turning from No.1, he found No.2 gone. Turning back, he found No.1 gone. They were both too far from the horizon to have reached it travelling at speeds noted. Both were high in the sky. 60-70 degrees above the horizon." (xx.) (See drawing below from Zan's letter)

Redondo Man Tells Of Seeing Saucers

Flying saucers were viewed on two occasions Sunday and Monday by a Redondo Beach man when he was in Indio and, later, while he was passing through Palm Springs.

"I didn't believe in flying saucers until I saw them," Carl L. Fritzen, 129 N. Pacific Coast Hwy., Redondo, said today.

Fritzen was working on a mine he has in Indio.

"I saw the first saucer at about 8:30 Sunday morning. It was hovering over mountains near Indio," Fritzen said.

It was "perfectly round." It jumped suddenly to a locale in the sky about a mile away and hovered again.

"It did this about four or five times. I watched it for about five minutes."

The saucer appeared to be solid and was white-colored with a tinge of sky blue, he said.

"Once it shot straight up in the air."

The second saucer he saw while driving homeward near mountain just west of Palm Springs.

"It looked like an artificial cloud and was near the mountains, but not as high as some of the peaks in the area."

It moved "like a streak" without making noise. It became smaller and finally sped away.

"I heard a 'whoosh' like the wind noise a bullet makes."

"I am just relaying this information on so that others will know what to look for," he said.

'Looked Like Tops With Rims On Them'—

UFO's Sighted Over City As Reported By Research

Two unidentified flying objects were sighted over Sullivan about the time that the Aerial Phenomena Research Group, Seattle, Washington, said reports of UFO were sighted in this section of the country.

Mrs. Mary McDonald, 326 South State Street, told The Times today that her daughter, specifically remembers seeing two objects that "looked like tops with rims on them" on the morning of February 18.

The Times published an article in Monday's paper that the research group requested all persons seeing any phenomena in the sky on or about Feb. 19 to report their sightings. Mrs. McDonald responded to this article.

Mrs. McDonald, who lived at the Simmons Apartments, 114 1/2 E. Washington St., on the day the UFO were sighted, related the following story to a Times reporter:

Mother's Story

"My daughter, Mary Lynn, is a fifth grade student at the New Central School, was home from school on Feb. 18. I specifically remember the day because I had an electrical meter transferred. I was lying on the couch in front of a large picture window looking to the east. Our apartment is on the second floor.

"I was gone between 10 and 11

a.m. My husband, who works nights, was in the bedroom sleeping. When I returned, my daughter was pale and trembling. She cried, 'Oh, mother, the awfulest thing happened. I saw two of the funniest things in the sky. They didn't look like airplanes or flying saucers. They looked like tops with rims on them. They were glary white.'

One Larger Than Other

The daughter told her mother that both objects had appeared over the tree-top level from the south. One was slightly larger than the other and both were moving slowly. At one point the objects seemed to hang motionless in the sky, then moved on north until they were out of sight.

Mrs. McDonald said she asked her daughter why she didn't call her father and she replied that she didn't want to awaken him.

The mother's brother, Walter Wenzel of Vigo County, substantiated the girl's report. He said a friend of his was driving to Terre Haute the same day and that he sighted two UFO's. The friend stopped his truck but could hear no sound from the slowly moving objects. He described them as exactly the same description.

Mrs. McDonald said today that Mary Lynn is frightened by UFO reports and that she is afraid of dark rooms, both of which were unconsidered before she observed the strange objects over Sullivan.

The Ball brothers, ages 13 and 9, respectively, who claim they "keep up with all late developments in the field of science," were enjoying the ancient kite flying sport about 4 p.m. Sunday when their "competition" flashed out of eastern skies.

Michael called the Herald-Tribune with this report: "Some object with a metallic gleam and shaped like a half-sphere, flew in from east of the bay and headed north . . . it was going too fast for a jet and it must have been above the stratosphere, because there was no sound or vapor trail."

He said the object made the trip across the horizon in one minute.

The two young flying enthusiasts want to compare notes with anyone else who may have seen it.

BAUDETTE MAN SEES MYSTERY AIR OBJECT

A Baudette pilot, traveling on Highway 72 south of Baudette, last week spotted an object resembling the headlight of a train. It was first sighted through the tree tops and, as the Baudette Region continues, "With the realization that there was no railroad within many miles, he became more curious and when he drove past the trees and brush which obscured vision, saw the object moving over the bog."

"It was said to be highly luminous, but not blindingly brilliant, roughly circular in form, with the light becoming indistinct at its outer limits. It was moving upwind at an estimated 50-60 miles per hour at just over tree top level and was close enough to the ground so that the motion of its passage appeared to suck swirling snow up under it."

"The man stopped his car and rolled down the window to check for sound, but there was none. The object, which appeared to be 15 to 18 feet in diameter, crossed over the highway and moved steadily in a southeasterly direction until out of sight."

"The observer is a pilot with a couple of thousand hours or more flying time and familiar with ordinary aircraft, has better than normal vision and is not subject to hallucinations or any other mental quirks. He didn't know what to call the object and neither do we."

We were watching a jet streak by at high altitude when seven round objects were sighted beyond and below the vapor trail. They hovered like a flock of birds for about three minutes, then sudden-

ly went into a formation and sped west at unbelievable speed. The jet had swung about when they took off. Within ten minutes four or five jets shot up from the horizon and criss crossed the sky like a labrador hunts in a field of hay.

R. J. Stevenson who joined the group later saw the seven objects briefly a half hour or so afterward.
